## New River Valley Passenger Rail Station Authority Update

The New River Valley Passenger Rail Station Authority met on August 29th and received an update from the Virginia Passenger Rail Authority (VPRA) regarding the recent news to relocate the New River Valley station to the Cambria area of Christiansburg. This was welcomed and exciting news as the service with Amtrak is projected to begin sooner at this location (2027) and cost much less. VPRA and Norfolk & Southern (NS) agreed to terms that utilizes existing NS property in Cambria while NS delivers the additional pocket track for boarding, the boarding platform, and a layover facility in Radford for servicing the train overnight. At the August meeting, the Station Authority began conversations about their role in the new location pertaining to evaluating the existing historic depot currently utilized by NS. Now that the final station location is determined, the architecture/engineering team of Wendel and Foresight Design will be under contract soon to commence the station evaluation process.

### NRV Recovery Ecosystem Received Award from VAPDC

At the August Regional Commission meeting the NRV Recovery Ecosystem was presented the Robert M. deVoursney Best Practices Award from the Virginia Association of Planning District Commissions. The Best Practices Award recognizes organizations that have



initiated innovative regional activities which have contributed significantly to the effectiveness of a region. The NRV Recovery Ecosystem is a five-year collaborative, regional opioid abatement program bringing together five jurisdictions for project delivery. It has received just under \$4.4 million in funding through two years from the Virginia Opioid Abatement Authority, along with more than \$1.5 million in local matching funds to date. In addition to the local governments that are involved, several other regional organizations and school divisions are partners in the project. # Fresh Vegetables. Commuter Savings. It's all at Your Local Farmers Market

You can get fresh veggies and the details on how to improve your commute. RIDE Solutions is heading out to your local farmers markets and spreading the word about how to find a better commute. This summer and fall and next spring we'll be talking with market shoppers about the benefits of carpooling and how to take charge of their commutes with the ConnectingVA app.

This past year commuters using the app to log their trips reduced 153,256 vehicle miles and 8,308 trips. While it's just a fraction of people not driving alone in the New River Valley, they saved \$99,537 over the last 12

#### Giles County Rt 100/Rt 42 Corridor Broadband Project

Giles County received a \$4,199,596 Virginia Telecommunications Initiative (VATI) grant for the RT 100/RT 42 Corridor Broadband Project, and Pembroke Telephone Cooperative (PemTel) received another \$700,000 in Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) grant funds for the same project. Both grants are from the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD) and the purpose of these funds are to not only provide broadband services to a large unserved/underserved area in Giles County, but also bolster economic development in the region.

In addition to these grant funds there is another \$643,604 in local funds committed to the project for a total of \$5,543,200. These funds will provide service to a total 629 passings which includes 611 households, 9 businesses, and 9 non-residential (places of worship, schools, libraries, medical facilities, etc.) buildings.

NRV Resiliency Network members Andi Golusky with NRV CARES, Cora Taylor with Radford University and Julie Fox with the Regional Commission spent the morning of August 13th providing a two hour interactive Trauma and Its Impact training to over sixty teacher aides as part of a county wide training day for Giles County Public



Schools. Participants learned about the impact of trauma and Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) on brain development and engaged in activities specific to providing trauma informed care in the classroom.

In efforts to expand the NRV's community capacity to provide training on trauma and resiliency, NRV Resiliency Network members Andi Golusky and Jenn Polanco with NRV CARES, Cora Taylor with RU, Dee Frith with NRVCS and Julie Fox with NRVRC provided an all day train the trainer on Thursday, August 22. The group added nine more community members to the list of now over 20 trainers in the NRV.

#### NRV Unites to Understand Substance Use and Harm Reduction

On August 6th and 7th, the Recovery Ecosystem hosted Elevyst, a public health consulting group, for a regional

training event titled "Demystifying Substance Use and Harm Reduction." This two-day event had tailored sessions: one for law enforcement, first responders, and justice-involved individuals, and another for healthcare professionals, elected officials, clergy, and community leaders. The training, delivered through a trauma-informed lens, focused on opioid addiction and poly-substance use disorders, covering the overdose crisis, communicable diseases, addiction, adverse childhood experiences, recovery, drug policies, stigma, harm reduction philosophies, and current programs in the region.
