


Hundreds of bills enter the legislative process each time the Virginia General Assembly meets. As a Representative Democracy, two groups of elected citizens - 40 Senators and 100 Delegates - study, discuss and vote on bills, and by doing so act for the people of Virginia.

The following steps are the typical process by which a bill becomes a law in Virginia.

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How a
Bill
Becomes

(sort of)

- Bill origin and introduction
- Committee assignment and consideration
- Committee-approved bills go to floor for vote
- Committee and floor actions, Part 2
- Executive branch consideration and possible actions
- Most approved bills take effect July 1

The Schedule

- \square Budget presentation (12/18/24)
- General Assembly convenes on the second
 Wednesday in January (1/8/25)
- "Crossover Day" is when each chamber must complete action on its own bills (except the budget bills); they then "cross over" to the other chamber for consideration (4-5 weeks into the session)
- □ Virginia Constitution (Article IV, Section 6) stipulates length of session; 60 days in even-numbered year ("long" session) and 30 days in odd-numbered year ("short" session), which can be extended another 30 days, but typically is 46 days total)

The Budget Timeline

- Virginia operates on a two-year (biennial) state
 budget (current is July 1, 2024 June 30, 2026)
- □ The governor proposes a state budget or amendments each December (12/18/24)
- Delegates and senators propose their own amendments and the House and Senate "money" committees craft their own budgets by mid-session
- Senior House/Senate budget-writers reach a compromise (hopefully) at the session's end for the governor to consider (propose amendments/sign)
- "The governor proposes, the General Assembly disposes"

The Impact of the State Budget

- □ Virginia's state biennial budget >\$180 billion
 - \square 1/3 general fund; 2/3 non-general fund
- "State aid to localities" is any payment made directly to a local government or school division
- Local governments are a key state service provider, carrying out state programs at the local level
- A significant amount of state dollars flows to localities

- □ Social Services
- Compensation Board
- Public Safety
- Mental, Behavioral and Children's Health/Services
- Health (not including Medicaid)
- Natural Resources

BY THE NUMBERS

- 2,284 bills (+ 1,311 resolutions) introduced in
 2024 session
- 1,046 bills passed; 201 bills vetoed by the governor (a record!)
- □ 845 new laws enacted!

The

- □ Localities are concerned every year with bills that attempt to:
 - □ Impose new mandates, expand existing mandates without adequate funding, or shift costs to localities
 - □ Usurp or restrict local authority, particularly local land use authority; this includes bills we don't expect and those we anticipate
- □ The list is often long—Housing/ADUs, short term rentals, zoning, solar, data centers, etc., etc., etc., etc.,

ZONING

- HB 755 localities can charge enhanced civil penalties for certain violations on commercial and industrial zoned property (\$3K to \$6K/12 months)
- HB 947 localities can regulate retail sales location of tobacco, vape and hemp, and may prohibit such location within 1,000 feet of a school/daycare
- HB 1236/SB 721- prohibits use of Comp Plan as basis for disapproving a site plan, and reduces time for local action on zoning cases (Housing Commission study)

HOUSING

- SB 297 Planning Commissions must use same approval process for residential as required for commercial
- HB 368/SB 195 Board of HCD to convene advisory group to recommend changes to the USBC to permit R-2 units to be served by one exit

HOUSING

- HB 1124/SB 233 "Faith in Housing Act" incentivizes religious organizations to develop affordable housing on their "excess" property (Housing Commission study)
- HB 900/SB 304 ADUs must be allowed in residential districts; prohibits dedicated parking, setbacks greater than primary dwelling, affinity between ADU occupants and primary dwelling, and redundant utilities (Housing Commission study)

SHORT TERM RENTALS (STR)

- □ HB 1461 Cannot prohibit STR solely on basis that the operator is a lessee or sublessee of the property, provided the owner has granted permission; a locality may limit a lessee or sublessee to one short-term rental
- SB 544 Prohibits barring, or requiring a special exception for, the use of a residential dwelling as a STR if the dwelling unit is the property owner's primary residence

The Impact of State Legis-Iation

SOLAR

- HB 650 Provides that SUP conditions may include a period of validity; shall be no less than three years for residential and electrical general projects
- □ HB 636/SB 597 Applicants can obtain approval from SCC for a solar or storage facility of 50+ MW or wind facility of 100+ MW if locality does not provide timely approval, denies the application, or if local requirements are more stringent than SCC (CO to 2025)

The Impact of State Legis-Iation

SOLAR

- □ SB 697 − Prohibits local limitations on the amount, density or size of ground-mounted solar or energy storage facilities until the total area under panels within the locality exceeds 4%; must allow use of solar panels that comply with generally accepted national environmental protection and product safety standards
- □ Note: If every locality had 4% of its land under panels, total would be 1,711 square miles (larger than RI, slightly less than DE)

DATA CENTERS

- JLARC studying data centers this year
 - Review of evolution and expected growth
 - Evaluate expected infrastructure needs/costs
 - Assess local impacts on natural, agricultural and historic resources
 - Review state and local regulation of siting and construction
- Report in December, 2024

Ways to Interact with the Process

- Understand the process!
- Get to know your legislators/develop relationships/educate them about what you do/meet with them prior to session
- Develop a legislative program/priorities or position statements (KISS)
- Understand their communication preferences and keep them informed
- □ Be respectful!

Other Factors in Play

- □ Dramatic turnover in membership (42% in Senate; 1/3 in House)
 - Loss of institutional knowledge/memory
 - Lack of knowledge of how state actions impact local governments
 - Mostly new committee chairs and membership
- Dems have very narrow margin of power
 Senate is 21-19
 House of Delegates is 51-49
- It's always an election year in VA! In 2025,
 Gov/Lt. Gov/AG and House of Delegates all are up for election in November
