


Citizens input is "welcome" at a public hearing on codes, bylaws, ordinances and other things beloved by planners and bureaucrats.

Tuesday at 6 p.m. in a room with uncomfortable chairs. Parking limited.

- Low accessibility for non-experts.
- Unclear how citizen input impacts process or outcomes.
- Emerging proposals appear to be "done deals"













- Has it changed over time?
- How does the public perceive its role?
 - Who does it work for?
 - What is it set up to do?
 - High stakes, zero-sum outcomes
 - Dialogue low, often absent
 - Proposal may pass but...



What Gets in the Way?



What Gets in the Way?

- Limited resources (time/\$\$)
 - Habits and comfort
 - Fear of conflict
- Desire to maintain control (info, process, outcomes)
 - Desire to manage citizen expectations



The Livability Initiative was a three-year regional planning process which provided an opportunity for New River Valley residents to develop a vision for the future and develop strategies that businesses, community organizations, local governments, and individuals can use to make this future vision a reality. This newsletter provides a progress update on the partnerships, projects and initiatives underway in the region that are contributing to the vision and goals outlined in this plan.



Home Matters

The New River Valley Aging In Place Leadership Team hosted its second workshop on October 22nd, 2014 to explore the financial, policy, and decision-making obstacles that traditionally get in the way of making our homes and communities truly lifespan friendly. 123 people participated in the workshop including local government staff, elected officials, in-home care givers, social workers, physical therapists, homebuilders, developers, assisted living administrators, realtors, and more. The workshop helped to increase participants' knowledge of aging in place issues in the NRV, identify respective challenges for caregivers, local governments, and developers, and share best practices for supporting aging in place.

The first workshop held in 2013 focused on exploring housing and neighbor-hood design features that could extend independence for older adults and foster healthy and successful aging in place in rural, suburban and core downtown areas. Did you know?



The population of seniors in the NRV is expected to double in the next 20 years.



In Giles and Pulaski, the under 25 population is in decline relative to other age groups.

This is likely to create an increased demand for services to support older citizens and a smaller tax base to fund those services.

Solarize Blacksburg

Solarize Blacksburg was a local initiative to bring solar to the Town of Blacksburg. The partners, which included Community Housing Partners, VA SUN, and Blacksburg's solar advocates and installers, asked solar installers across the state to bid on a group of installations. Through the power of bulk purchasing, Solarize Blacksburg helped drive down the cost of solar for Blacksburg residents. 59 homeowners purchased a total of 320 kW amount of solar. Additionally, 60 homeowners signed up for a free home energy evaluation, which were offered to all participants. More than a dozen localities around the state have expressed interested in creating similar programs, and 9 have actually done so since Blacksburg launched the first Virginia program in March of 2014.

Affordable Green Senior Housing in Blacksburg

On Grissom Lane in Blacksburg, there are noweight new apartments that provide affordable housing to low income people age 55 and older. The project came about as a result of Livability Initiative demographic projections of the aging population and the need for affordable rental housing in Blacksburg. The new homes are also "net-zero" which means that the housing produces as much energy as it consumes through the use of a solar electric photovoltaic system. Households earning less than 80% of the area median income and residents that live or work in Montgomery County receive first preference.

Summit Place: Supportive Housing in Giles

Summit Place, a residential supportive living community, is under construction in the Town of Rich Creek in Giles County. The housing, which will open in spring 2015, will serve people aged 62 and older in need of housing with support services including meals. The building will be highly energy efficient through the use of structural insulated panels and will include a solar hot water system.

Floyd's New Green Housing Start-Ups

The Floyd County Economic Development Authority is working with two green housing start-ups that are interested in producing modular, LEEDcertified housing in Floyd for a large regional market. EcoWorks, LLC is focused on great, locally-matched architecture for single and multi family housing while D wellings is focused on smart, micro-housing that would be for individuals and specialized needs such as Habitat for Humanity and USAID. A Floyd Habitat for Humanity and HOME Consortium project is looking to incorporate a prototype of the microhousing as an accessory dwelling unit.

Revisions Proposed to Floyd County's Subdivision Ordinance

The Floyd County Planning Commission has recommended a tightening of the family subdivision loophole in the Floyd County Subdivision Ordinance. Currently any piece of land (not under easement) can be divided into 1 acre parcels if landowners call it a family subdivision ordinance. The current ordinance is too difficult to enforce and also impacts the County's ability to protect vulnerable groundwater supplies and maintain the agricultural and rural landscape. The Board of Supervisors held their public hearing on the proposed changes in late November but have not made a final decision.

Appalachian Spring

Appalachian Spring is a program initiated by the Southwest Virginia Cultural Heritage Foundation and the Friends of Southwest Virginia to develop and promote the outdoor recreation and natural resource assets of Southwest Virginia (which includes 19 counties). The program's goal is to create an international awareness of the region as a travel, and ultimately, business development and living destination. The program is funded by the Economic Development Administration, Rural Development and the Appalachian Regional Commission. The program is focused on creating income, jobs and local government revenues through the promotion of major recreation destinations, connection of outdoor assets to local communities, and direct assistance to entrepreneurs and appropriate businesses. In the New River Valley region this program will focus on the Blue Ridge Parkway, the NewRiver and the Appalachian Trail. An inventory is currently being developed of all the outdoor recreation businesses, campgrounds, boat launches, lodging, restaurants, and guide companies near these locations. Branding for SWVA and the Appalachian Spring Initiative will begin in February, 2015.

The Floyd County High School Farm: Growing the Next Generation of Farmers

The Floyd County High School Farm was launched this year on land left in trust for that purpose by a retired school teacher, Nola Albert. The farm will function as a "laboratory" for agriculture students to get hands-on experience with managing and operating all aspects of a diversified, functioning farm. The vision is for this to be a place for youth to get real world experience, get their hands dirty in vegetable production, livestock, orchards, and learn how to manage and market products produced at the farm.

Passenger Rail Study

A study will start in January 2015, to better understand public demand for extending Amtrak passenger rail service from Roanoke to the New River Valley. The effort will also analyze potential station locations (Radford, Christiansburg, Pulaski) in terms of Amtrak needs, parking availability, and multi-modal access.



A public-private partnership between the Town of Black sburg, Virginia Tech, NR VPDC, Black sburg Partnership, Roanoke-Black sburg Technology Council is currently evaluating ways to increase internet bandwidth to users in/near the Town of Blacksburg. The partnership contributed \$75,000 for the effort. In 2015, the Planning District Commission staff will conduct a community survey to determine areas in need of a higher bandwidth.

The Floyd Innovation Center

The Floyd County Economic Development Authority is owner and landlord of a new13,250 square foot facility, which provides a variety of office, research, event and shared meeting spaces for tenants and members. The mission of the Floyd Innovation Center is to support entrepreneurs and small, innovative design and technology-driven companies. The Center features timber framing from **Dreaming Creek Timber Frame Construction** and furnishings by **Phoenix Hardwoods**, both local companies based in Floyd County. The center's energy-efficient construction includes structurally insulated panels and solar hot water and is oriented for solar photo-voltaic panels in the future. The Floyd County Economic Development Authority raised more than \$2.3 million in grant funds from the Virginia Tobacco Commission, the federal Economic Development Administration and the Appalachian Regional Commission, along with \$60,000 from the County to make the center a reality. **Eco Works**, LLC, a green housing start-up, is the first tenant to occupy the space.

NRV Agriculture Development Strategic Plan

Over the past two years, Montgomery, Pulaski, and Giles have been developing an agri-tourism and agri-business plan. This tri-county effort has produced maps of all agri-businesses, agri-tourism venues, and restaurants serving local food. The project was a partnership between VT Cooperative Extension, local agricultural producers, along with local and state government leadership and was completed in December 2014.

Marketing the Marketplace

The Pulaski County Chamber of Commerce secured a \$57,000 grant from the USDA Farmer's Market Promotion Program to expand it's marketing efforts of the Tuesday night Marketplace held at the Historic Train Depot which features local artisans and growers, music, local wine and craft beer, and food vendors.

Value of the Livability Initiative

- **Data** to better understand citizen needs and preferences.
